


In an age of declining populations across Japan, the national census of 2020 shows that Izumo is the only city in the San' in Region that has seen an increase in population. We are proud to say that ours is a city full of vitality and overflowing potential. With full confidence, love, and pride in Izumo City, we have devised a new comprehensive development plan to allow us to keep up the pace as a gateway to the Sea of Japan, an energetic top runner of the region, and a driving force in the area surrounding Lake Shinji and Lake Nakaumi.

The circumstances surrounding us have undergone incredible change. In particular, the COVID-19 pandemic has called all of us to greatly revaluate our lifestyles and values. Furthermore, the Russian invasion of Ukraine has acted as a catalyst to violent changes in international relations, leaving us in an era of complexity, uncertainty, and ambiguity. Izumo City supports sustainable development goals (SDGs).

SDGs are development goals the international community should strive for by 2030, as defined by the United Nations Sustainable Development Summit in September, 2015. 17 goals and 169 targets were designated to realize a sustainable planet, and it was sworn that "no one on Earth will be left behind".

8 year period from FY 2022 to FY 2029




Izumo City's comprehensive development plan, Izumo Saga 2030, is composed of a basic overview and a basic plan.



The 27 urban development measures listed in the basic overview are expanded upon as concrete initiatives and targets.



Generating long-term

Securing employment opportunities is an issue of the utmost importance to support both the lives of our residents and the vitality of Izumo Power. In the Residents' Satisfaction Survey, job-seeking support and increasing job opportunities by attracting companies to the region were in the top 10 needs. While drawing outside enterprises into Izumo as well as promoting local companies and supporting start-ups, we are also working on proactively securing personnel for the welfare and agriculture sectors while ensuring that there is a place for the elderly to participate in society. By doing so, we are aiming to secure employment opportunitites in all sectors, support job-hunting, and ultimately create 2,000 new employment (8-year goal) jobs over the next 8 years (annual average: 250). (Jobs created in FY 2021: 268.)

Global warming countermeasures are a common issue across the world. As a city, we aim to achieve zero CO2 emissions by 2050, and by 2030, a reduction of at least 46% (compared to 2013) in keep with the national target. We will introduce renewable energy, promote its use, and advance energy conservation. (Reduction compared to 2013 as of 2019: 10.1%.)

In order to realize a strong regional economy, Izumo will utilize one of its strengths, its brand power, as well as its natural resources, unique history and culture, and promote exchanges by engaging people. Furthermore, we will advance cooperation in the Chūkai, Lake Shinji, and Mount Daisen areas. In the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic and the border closures that followed, various initiatives will be undertaken with the aim of increasing the number of people engaging with the city to 100 million* over the next 8 years (annual average: 12.5 million people). (Number of people engaged in 2018: 11.62 million.)

Challenge:

Increasing the birth rate and extending the healthy life expectancy (8-year goal)

We want to move towards a city that is easy to live in from infancy to old age, by raising both the overall birth rate (as measured in children born per female resident) and the healthy life expectancy (average independent life expectancy after 65 years*).

The vision of Izumo's population growth as described in the Second Izumo City Town, People, and Work Creation Comprehensive Strategy is to increase the average births to 2.1 children per female resident by 2030. (2020: 1.72 children.) Furthermore, as we head towards an age where people routinely live for over 100 years, it is paramount that we achieve a system for adequate healthcare and disability prevention. This will allow residents to have a role and participate in society at any age while leading fruitful lives. Moreover, by improving our healthcare system, we hope to extend the average healthy life expectancy by 1 year in the next 8 years (by 2030). (Average independent life expectancy after 65 years in Izumo City 2011~2015: men 17.54 years, women 21.00 years.) In addition, we are hoping to achieve a 3-year extension on the average healthy lifespan by 2040 (compared to 2016) in accordance with the government's Healthy Life Expectancy Extension Plan (2019).

*Average independent life expectancy after 65 years: from the age of 65 onwards, there is no need for daily assistance (nursing care level 2 and above), and living independently is possible. (prefectural definition)

of high school students feel attachment to and take pride in Izumo (8-year goal) According to a survey, 81.1% of 3rd-year high school students feel attachment to and take pride in Izumo, either fully or to a degree. This is a result of being born in Izumo and connecting with the community, schools, and other residents. These feelings will impact whether they wish to reside in the city long-term.

We aim to further develop our city and education to encourage the children to support their hometown, and to reach 85% in 8 years from now (2030).



In order to help our residents live rich, fulfilling lives with opportunities to learn and have fun, we aim to see life-long learning and communal facilities reach a visitorship of 22 million people over the next 8 years (annual average: 2.75 million).

*Life-long learning and communal facility: cultural facilities like Izumo Shimin Kaikan, social education facilities like libraries, sports facilities like gyms, community centers, etc.
